

A NOTE FROM OUR **EXECUTIVE** DIRECTOR JEFF HUTH



People often ask me what makes the JP4 Foundation unique and special. In the land of 10,000 nonprofits, what allows us to stand out?

The answer is our mentors.

The unwavering dedication of our exceptional mentors is the heartbeat of our success. In 2023, more than 30 young adults chose to invest their time and talent with the IP4 Foundation, and their commitment has propelled us to new heights.

Throughout the year, our mentors have been an inspiration, serving as outstanding employees who command respect from the children they guide and as individuals with profound responsibilities beyond their roles. Many balance family caretaking, multiple jobs, collegiate studies and personal challenges, yet their passion for JP4 remains steadfast.

This year, we learned a profound lesson about the reciprocal power of positive relationships; the healing influence flows both ways. The mentor relationship benefits the children and

is equally transformative for the mentors. For mentors, this relationship offers a chance to leave behind a legacy of leadership, knowledge and wisdom. This mutually beneficial bond enriches mentors' lives, providing personal fulfillment and satisfaction and growth.

Our mentors' training and professional development help them develop highly valued workplace skills, attracting the attention of organizations eager to engage with our mentors and offer them full-time positions. While our primary focus is on impacting elementary school students, a remarkable byproduct of our efforts is the development of our future workforce—a workforce that leads with compassion, empathy and **professionalism**, carrying an infectious energy.

I welcome the opportunity to meet each one of you this year. Whether over coffee, lunch or a casual happy hour, I am eager to discuss the incredible contributions the JP4 Foundation is making to our community.

OUR PROGRAMS

In 2023, the JP4 Foundation offered year-round programming, including summer-long camps in Ramsey and Hennepin Counties, and our after-school program, the Diamond Club, which was exclusively available in Ramsey County.



Summer-Long Camps

We partner with local schools, community centers, and other youth organizations to provide eight weeks of mentor-led summer-long camps for children ages 5-13 in underserved urban areas of Minneapolis and St. Paul.



Diamond Club

Our after-school program is designed to ensure elementary students can create meaningful and authentic relationships with young adult mentors who share the students' community and culture.

Both programs are mentor-led and follow curricula developed by an urban education specialist. Our lesson plans align with the MN Department of **Education Social Emotional Implementation Guidelines and are centered** around our core mission:



Healthy Meals. We ensure that children receive nutritious snacks featuring whole grains, fruits and proteins, along with the chance to bring food home.



Healthy Activity. By combining physical activity with life-skill building, we provide a distinctive and engaging approach to both academic learning and social-emotional development. This promotes positive interactions among peers and adults.



Healthy Relationships. With a 2:1 child-to-mentor ratio, we guarantee personal attention, making every child feel valued and understood. Constructive adultchild relationships profoundly influence a child's development by offering support, inspiration and vital life-navigation skills. Through these relationships, we aim to spark the imagination of children, light the flame of future aspirations and inspire them to thrive in their teenage years and beyond, particularly in underserved communities.

SUMMER CAMPS

Our summer-long camps, offered across the Twin Cities area, met weekly for eight weeks, equipping campers with the skills to become responsible, resourceful individuals and to prepare for the academic year ahead. Throughout the summer, mentors led children through lessons and activities focused on social-emotional learning, emphasizing active play.

Positive Behaviors

Children learn and exhibit self-management, impulse control, stress management, and perseverance, all necessary for responsible and constructive conduct.

This year marked our sixth summer collaborating with the Sanneh Foundation. The familiar faces of returning mentors brought a sense of continuity and warmth. It was humbling to see that children remembered the mentors' names and faces.

Our inaugural summer at the Jerry Gamble Boys and Girls Club in Minneapolis witnessed remarkable personal growth in campers. Initially, acclimating them to our structure and conflict resolution required extra effort. Our mentors patiently instructed and used the skills and techniques taught during training. As the weeks unfolded, a remarkable transformation took place. The bonds between campers and mentors blossomed, creating a harmonious camp environment. The impact of these relationships was underscored when campers, learning of a shortened session due to a planned off-site activity, tearfully pleaded to remain at camp or to include their mentors in the event. In a heartwarming surprise, mentors appeared at

the Splash Pad and were greeted by a rush of wet hugs, demonstrating the importance of these relationships.

This common thread—the profound impact of the mentor relationship—emerged at each location. The camps became spaces for fun and games and, more importantly, safe environments for developing healthy relationships. As the summer progressed, conflicts diminished. Campers welcomed their mentor with enthusiastic hugs and excited stories of the previous week.

As we reflect, we cannot help but celebrate the growth witnessed, the joy shared and the connections forged. We thank the supporters who make these transformative experiences possible. Together, we continue to build brighter futures for the young hearts that will carry the lessons of this summer into a lifetime of resilience, empathy and thriving relationships.

In 2023, we successfully completed our second year of Diamond Club after-school programming for 2nd and 3rd graders at Achieve Language Academy and Urban Academy in St. Paul. We launched the 2023-2024 school year with an expanded offering that now encompasses 4th and 5th graders at both schools.

Each week, four cohorts of 30 students meet for 90 minutes. While the content of the lesson plans varies weekly, the structure remains constant. Every session integrates physical activity with life skills development to allow students room to "just be kids". This format provides a distinctive approach to academic and social-emotional learning while fostering positive social interaction.

Students thrive with the consistent structure that each session follows:

Greeting: Students and mentors engage with a creative 'handshake of the week.'

Share: An icebreaker group activity that encourages dialogue and camaraderie.

Walk-and-Talk: Each mentor pairs with two students for deeper, more personal discussions.

Snack: Mentor-student groups enjoy a nutritious snack that includes a whole grain, fruit and protein.

Physical Activity: Mentors lead students through a physical activity promoting movement, teamwork and how to win and lose. Activities have a social-emotional learning objective and a corresponding academic skill.

Check Out: Students reflect on their session experiences and discuss takeaways with their mentors.

The cornerstone of our program's high engagement and student success is the mentorstudent relationship. With a mentor for every two students, we ensure that each child has the chance to form a meaningful connection with their mentor.

The Diamond Club fosters a secure and trusting atmosphere that not only supports the emotional health of our students but also demonstrates the profound influence mentors have on opening lines of communication and promoting personal development.



Teacher Survey Results


Diamond Club Impact Assessment

Our Mentors

Our mentors are the reason children enthusiastically embrace JP4 programming. We partner with World Youth Connect, Page Education Foundation and the local community to recruit, hire and train young adult mentors who reflect the culture and community of the children we serve.

In 2023, our mentors completed over 45 hours of training and professional development to adeptly deliver our evidence-based curriculum. The competencies they acquire and exhibit are invaluable, extending benefits far beyond their tenure at JP4:

- **Empathy and Compassion:** Our mentors genuinely understand and care for the children, acknowledging their challenges with heartfelt empathy.
- **Effective Communication:** They articulate clearly and listen attentively, tailoring their interaction to each child's needs.
- Adaptability: Recognizing the distinct needs of every child, mentors adjust their strategies to suit each relationship.
- Positive Role Modeling: Demonstrating conduct and values that promote the children's personal development.
- **Problem-Solving:** Skillfully addressing the various challenges the children may encounter.
- Patience and Persistence: Building trust through consistent support and dedication to the children's growth.
- Cultural Competence: Acknowledging and valuing the cultural and socioeconomic backgrounds of the families we serve.

Internship Program

The JP4 Foundation has earned a reputation for providing meaningful, skill-building internship opportunities.

In 2023, the JP4 Foundation, in collaboration with the University of St. Thomas, hosted interns who played a substantial role in advancing various initiatives within our organization. These internships are designed to be non-prescriptive, challenging interns to leverage their creativity and innovation while adhering to business guidelines and safeguarding our organizational identity.

Specific projects undertaken by our interns included a creative challenge where the current intern team was tasked with using a budget of \$2,000 to generate donations of \$12,500 or more. Previous projects have spanned a diverse range of activities, such as planning fundraising events, conducting experience journey mapping, engaging in marketing and social media campaigns, developing personas, as well as gathering, synthesizing and analyzing survey data.

We are proud to report that our internship program not only contributes to the professional growth of the participants but also often inspires them to remain involved with the JP4 Foundation. Our past interns frequently become staunch supporters of our mission.
