We've built a thriving organization around the concept of mentorship. We know mentorship is a powerful way to give kids a sense of belonging. It provides opportunities for them to be seen and heard. Our formula for creating that symbiotic value starts with comprehensive training and support for our mentors, which includes education to address childhood trauma and life skills, such as financial literacy, career counseling and professional networking. This gives our mentors the tools they need to build meaningful connections with their mentees, rooted in the common bond of their shared community.

Through this reimagined approach, we're building an engine of positive, reciprocal impacts for our young people.

A Unique and Compelling Model Takes Shape

It took a few years for JP4 to build something uniquely effective, but it's been worth it. As we've evolved the organization, we've discovered something we call the "multiplier effect."

JP4 started with a model you might expect from a youth-focused non-profit. We created opportunities for kids to learn, pursue wellness and be exposed to the full possibilities of life. After school and over the summer, we provide camps and programs that measurably improve physical, emotional and mental well-being for kids ages 5-13 who are exposed to adverse childhood experiences. This is, without question, an important and rewarding mission in itself. We built what we believe is the strongest program for that pursuit in the Twin Cities.

But then, we found our "multiplier": We hire mentors from the same communities we serve.

This not only makes our mentors more relatable, credible and approachable for our kids — it provides our mentors with opportunities to learn critical life skills, from leadership to money management to public speaking. We're providing kids in St. Paul and Minneapolis with opportunity, access, and the support they need to be the best version of themselves – while opening new doors for our mentors, helping them grow into and become part of a promising new generation of students, professionals and leaders.

The results are compelling. After just a few years of this approach, we've introduced colleges and corporations to young adults who, through our personal and professional development training, have strengthened their soft skills, became great classmates and coworkers and grown into engaged community members – eager to both learn and contribute.

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Carefully Designed Curricula

Our Summer Camps and Diamond Club follow curricula developed by an urban education specialist. Lesson plans align with Minnesota Department of Education Social Emotional Implementation Guidelines. They also align around our core mission to reimagine youth mentoring to create exponential impact in our communities by providing:

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Healthy Meals

Ensure children receive nutritious snacks featuring whole grains, fruits and proteins, along with the chance to bring food home.

Healthy Activity

Combine physical activity with life skill training for an approach to academic learning and social-emotional development. Promote positive interactions with peers and adults.

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Healthy Relationships

A 2:1 child-to-mentor ratio ensures personal attention, making every child feel valued and understood. Constructive adult-child relationships profoundly influence a child's development by offering support, inspiration and vital life-navigation skills. "By guiding and supporting others, I can help them effectively communicate ideas, provide constructive feedback, and motivate individuals to achieve their goals. These skills are highly valuable in any professional setting and can help me become a more effective leader in my own career."


Diamond Club

Aligned with Community Beliefs & Values


A commitment to meeting real needs




Q1 Do you think that children in this community live with adverse childhood experiences?


Q2 Do you think that children who live with these challenges would benefit from an after-school program or a summer camp?



Q3 What features of an after-school or summer camp program do you think are most important?




Q4 Which of the following aspects of mentoring are most important to provide children with a positive experience?




Q5 In what grades do you think children would benefit from an after-school or summer
